Machine Accreditation

David Lack & Fred Hill have developed a system to have a coloured dot to indicate accreditation to use the equipment in the Sunnybank Men's Shed for both the Woodwork and Metalwork areas.

The AMSA Men's Shed Health and Safety document has been thoroughly reviewed and if we were to follow their guide to the letter little work would be achieved, and the members would not be too enthusiastic to endorse Therefore this document has been used as a guide to

formulate a OH&S policy more suited to our requirements. There will be three coloured dots (to separate the Wood working and the Metal working areas) on our name tags **Yellow**:

All hand tools which are considered low risk with little, or no training required. **Blue:**

Wood Workshop area. Equipment and items which are considered medium risk and are being used by a person who has been assessed as competent, is familiar with their use and requires minor supervision. It is likely that Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) is needed and must be used. Safety guards must be in place prior to use. This includes all powered bench tools and powered hand tools which if misused would likely cause personal injury.

Machine Accreditation (Cont)

Red:

Metal Workshop area. Equipment and items which are considered medium risk and are being used by a person who has been assessed as competent, is familiar with their use and requires minor supervision. It is likely that Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) is needed and must be used. Safety guards must be in place prior to use. This includes all powered bench tools and powered hand tools which if misused would likely cause personal injury.

It is expected that all members will have a yellow dot. It is also felt that the use of a battery powered drill should be included for the yellow dot.

The blue and red will be used in addition when the member has been assessed as competent to use the equipment for that respective area. It is important that members understand the reason for introduction of this system that it is about the safe operation of equipment and personal safety. The induction/assessment is a requirement of our insurance. We need this documented and maintain updated Shed records to be compliant with our insurance policy.

The level of training provided is basic. Members should be encouraged to ask for advice and assistance from other Shedders and work with a buddy. (This happens most of the time)

A regular training day on Thursday has been commenced, you simply need to add your name to the list on the white board and turn up to shed on Thursday morning
